Safety tips when severe weather strikes:

- Never approach or touch downed power lines. If a power line falls on your car, remain inside until help arrives.
- If you smell gas, do not turn on lights or electric appliances and don't use any phones. They could cause an explosion.
- If you smell gas after severe weather, leave the building immediately. Go to a safe place and call MLGW. Do not go back into your home until MLGW says it is safe to do so.
- If you use a portable generator, do not operate it inside your home or closed garage due to carbon monoxide danger. Also, do not plug it into a wall outlet to power your home; that can cause a dangerous fire hazard.
- Should you have downed wires, gas leaks or a broken water main, call MLGW's 24-hour, emergency-only hotline at 528-4465.

City Council approves MLGW's 2018 budget

The Memphis City Council approved MLGW's \$1.95 billion operating and capital budget in February. Also approved was an increase in gas and electric rates of two percent, effective for the July revenue

month. When combined, the typical residential customer will see the cost of these services increase an average of \$3 per month (\$.72 per month in gas and \$2.28 for electric) starting in July.

The rate option approved was a compromise. It was not one of our preferred options because it will mean that the Division will have to seek the next rate increase sooner.

A water rate increase of 1.05 percent was approved in January, which is expected to raise about \$1 million annually and will mean residents will pay about 18 cents more per month.

The extra income will fund an aquifer study which will examine the underground protective clay layers leading to the Memphis Sand aquifer where Memphis draws its drinking water.

Make springtime a safe time

With the upcoming change to nicer, warmer temperatures, we frequently get severe weather. MLGW wants you and your family to be safe and protected during severe weather outbreaks, so here are a few tips to increase safety:

- Identify the safest place in your home in case of emergency. It might be a closet or bathroom in the middle of your home, away from exterior doors and windows. Go there if you hear severe weather warnings.
- Stock that place with emergency items such as a first aid kit, flashlights, a battery-operated radio or TV and extra batteries.
- Store bottled water or tap water in sterile containers, enough for several days, two quarts per person per day. Store some non-spoilable food items that don't require heating, as well as a can opener.
- Include a whistle or similar device to alert emergency personnel in case of rescue efforts.
- Store a supply of necessary prescription medicines.
