Call Before You Dig

Spring's here. Have some yardwork to do? Dial 811 before any dig—including planting trees and shrubs. It's important to know where your utility lines are marked. The depth of utility lines varies and there may be multiple utility lines in a common area. Digging without calling can disrupt service to an entire neighborhood, harm you and those around you and potentially result in fines and repair costs. Calling 811 before every digging job gets your underground utility lines marked for free and helps prevent undesired consequences.

You should be sure to call 811 in advance of your scheduled dig to allow time for the request to be processed. Once your lines are marked, you will know their approximate location and you can dig safely. Knowing what's below will protect you your.

Through May, when customers pay their bills or visit MLGW community offices, MLGW cashiers will give them a free soft drink coupon that can be redeemed after paying their next bill using an MLGW payment kiosk at one of the Exxon On the Run Convenience Stores. After paying at the kiosk, customers can present the receipt and coupon to the On the Run store clerk to receive their free drink. The payment kiosks at On the Run stores are cash-only; a \$2 transaction fee is charged by TIO Networks, which operates the kiosks. MLGW does not receive any revenue from this fee. Winter Gas Costs 10 Percent Lower

Despite the fact that the nation has seen rising wholesale natural gas costs this winter, the prices that MLGW charges its customers for natural gas is considerably lower this winter than it was last winter. In fact, the lower prices charged by MLGW for natural gas has saved the average

residential customer \$17 per month this winter. The decrease in the price of natural gas is due to a number of factors including a change in natural



gas buying strategy at MLGW, and occurred despite a 6.8 percent gas rate increase in January. In addition to lower natural gas prices, MLGW customers have also taken advantage this winter of slightly warmer than normal temperatures during three of the four recent winter months. This has resulted in even greater customer savings due to less natural gas consumption.

According to the study, AmerenUE customers in St. Louis have the lowest cost per 1,000 kilowatts. "There are few cities that can say they have lower electric rates than ours. That is something that every Memphian should be aware of and proud to say," said Jerry Collins, MLGW president and CEO, "While energy costs have risen nationwide in recent years, this shows that MLGW is doing a good job of controlling the impact to the customer."
