April brought severe weather to Memphis

Mother Nature dealt Memphis a heavy blow with repeated storms in April. On Monday, April 4, severe weather



downed trees and power lines, claimed one life and caused approximately \$3 million worth of damaged property. The storm ranked as the fifth most damaging to MLGW's electric system in recent history and left 71,000 utility customers without power, mainly inside the I-240 loop.

MLGW troubleshooters, tree-trimming and repair crews, and other needed personnel immediately went to work to restore power. Working around the clock, and aided by more than a dozen crews from other utilities in Tennessee, Illinois and Missouri, power was restored to all customers by April 8.

A mere two weeks later, on April 19, the community endured a repeat performance of severe weather with winds gusting up to 70 mph and knocking power out to approximately 64,000 Shelby County customers. This time, Raleigh, Frayser, Arlington, Lakeland and areas along the Sam Cooper corridor appeared to be the heaviest hit. Once again, MLGW personnel and out-of-town crews descended upon the community and worked continuously to restore power within just a few days.

MLGW has received many kind letters from customers expressing their appreciation, and we are truly grateful for their sentiments. Here's what you can do to optimize our efforts to restore power and keep the community safe:

Reporting an outage

Call MLGW's outage reporting line at 544-6500 immediately upon learning that you've lost power. Don't assume that your address is included with reports of other outages in the neighborhood. If your outage is caused by a downed tree on your property or some other type of isolated incident, we won't necessarily be aware of it until you contact us. You can track outage numbers via MLGW's outage map at www.mlgw.com/outagemap or via our new iPhone App featured in this issue.

Downed Power Lines

To report an emergency such as downed wires or gas leaks, please call 528-4465. This number should be treated like 911 and only used for these types of emergencies.

MLGW urges customers to be aware of their surroundings as they sift through debris and examine damage to their property. Customers should avoid contact with downed power lines — even if their home or area has experienced a loss of power, the lines could still be energized and deadly.

Customers are also asked to avoid the immediate area where MLGW crews are working. These work sites can be extremely hazardous.

> Call 811 before you dig Don't risk hitting a gas line, disrupting neighborhood service, and facing potential fines and repair costs. Before you begin

a digging project, contact Tennessee One Call at 811 to request that a professional locating crew mark the underground utility lines on your property. The service is free, and it is federally mandated.
