Bill payment options change due to pandemic restrictions

Due to the pandemic restrictions and for the safety of customers and employees, the utility has closed public access to all MLGW Community Offices. Drive-thru windows will remain open for payments by cash, check, and money orders only. Customers using drive-thru services are encouraged to bring their bill with them to make processing payments faster. Drop boxes are available at all locations. Additionally, no cash payments can be put in drop boxes – only checks and money orders.

Young covered the changes and improvements of the past year, the accomplishments in the past year, the financial well-being of the Division, plans for the future and what the recent City Council approval of MLGW rate increases will allow for infrastructure improvements.

Young highlighted the MLGW Way, uplifting the values of compassionate service, safety, integrity, ownership and inclusion and ways employees met those objectives throughout 2019. He also discussed MLGW's goals for 2020 and the accomplishments so far this year including:

New Substation 89 - First Quarter: This new substation is located at Mendenhall and Shelby Drive and will serve roughly 8,000 customers. It will provide load relief for growth in the Hickory Hill

Prepare your system and yourself for the summer

Feeling comfortable during a hot and humid Memphis summer can be challenging, but it does not have to be costly. Here are some of the easiest ways to stay cool and save:

* Have a professional, reputable contractor clean and inspect your air conditioner. This should be done every year, whether you have window or central units.

Check your air conditioner's filter every time you receive your utility bill. Look for a dust build-up that can restrict the airflow and place stress on the system. This added stress causes wear and tear on the unit, and increases operation costs.

Always replace the filter cover. By creating a tight seal around the filter opening, you can block any unconditioned air that is being pulled into the unit.

We use fans to move the air inside your home. This gives the sensation that it is five degrees cooler than the actual temperature.

* Shade windows on the sunny side of your home. Keep drapes closed or add room-darkening shades to block out the heat from the sun.

Do not set your thermostat at a colder setting than normal when you turn on your air conditioner. It will not

cool your home any faster and could result in excessive cooling and, therefore, unnecessary expenses.

★ Set the thermostat at 78° degrees or higher for the most energy efficient operation. Each degree below this setting can add up to six percent to your cooling costs.

Use a programmable thermostat to allow the inside

temperature to rise while you are away from home for four hours or longer. Pre-set the thermostat to adjust back to your normal comfort range one half hour before returning home.

 ★ Use your programmable thermostat setting to automatically allow the temperature to increase at bedtime. Sleep under lightweight bedding and use fans during sleep.

★ Do not place lamps near your thermostat. The thermostat senses the heat produced from the lamp and causes the air conditioner to run longer than necessary.

Plant trees or shrubs to shade air-conditioning units but do not block the airflow. A unit operating in the shade uses as much as 10 percent less electricity than the same one operating under the sun.

The outside portion of a central air conditioner is the condensing unit. Keep it clear from dried mud, debris and grass clippings, because it needs to breathe.
