Budget Billing

Wish you knew the amount of your MLGW bill before you received it? Wish your MLGW bill was the same amount every month? MLGW Budget Billing is the answer.



Through Budget Billing, MLGW analyzes your previous six months' or year's total usage, adjusts for rate changes and weather conditions, and divides the total into 12 monthly installments, which you pay each month until the following March, when the Budget Billing installment for the next 12 months is determined.

To qualify, you must have had an active account at your current address for six months. You must be current on your account to remain in the program, and if you are disconnected for non-payment or change addresses, you will be removed from the program and will not be able to participate in Budget Billing for six months.




MLGW hosts FIRST exhibit

Remember to call for your pilot safety inspection

Pilot safety inspection appointments scheduled between now and Dec. 31 incur a \$54 fee. The fee will be billed to customer accounts and covers up to three gas heating appliances. Each additional appliance over three will cost an additional \$16 fee. The service is free to physically challenged customers and seniors (60 years and older). Customers can schedule an appointment by calling 820-7878 and choosing a convenient date and time. The Interactive Voice Response (IVR) system can also be used to schedule an appointment. A 16-digit account number is needed to use the system. English-speaking customers need to press the following prompts: 1-2-3-2. Spanishspeakers must press 3-2-3-2.

For the best selection of dates and times, customers are encouraged to call as soon as possible. MLGW's Customer Care Center is open from 7 a.m. - 7 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Be aware of the silent killer!

Carbon monoxide is often called the "silent killer" for good reason. This colorless, odorless and tasteless gas is extremely dangerous and even deadly.

You are probably more aware of the potential for carbon monoxide poisoning in the winter when gas heaters are in frequent use, but it can happen whenever natural gas is not being burned properly or an appliance is not vented as it should be.

Carbon monoxide poisoning is especially dangerous because its victims often don't recognize the symptoms until it's too late. Headaches, fatigue, dizziness, nausea, vomiting, and the inability to think clearly are all tell-tale signs of carbon monoxide poisoning. If you suspect carbon monoxide poisoning, seek medical assistance immediately and move the victim, if possible, to a well-ventilated area,

then call Memphis Light, Gas and Water's 24-hour emergency number, 528-4465.

To prevent carbon monoxide poisoning in your home, make

sure that all natural gas appliances, such as your water heater, furnace and space heaters, are vented outside. Keep chimneys and flues clear of all debris, and use gas space heaters only according to manufacturers' instructions. We also recommend that you have your gas appliances inspected annually by a licensed professional.

Remember, natural gas should always burn a clean and steady blue flame. If you notice a yellow flame, or one that seems to "float" or waver, call our Customer Care Center at 544-6549.

MLGW employees raise funds for worthy causes

Each year, MLGW participates in the Food Bank's area-wide Operation Feed campaign, raising money to provide meals for families in need. Tips for winter energy savings

It's that time of year when the leaves fall, the wind gets colder and winter is right around the corner. That means heating bills, which can average 40 percent or more of your annual utility costs.

Use the following energy-saving advice to help reduce your winter utility bills. These free or low-cost steps not only save you money, they also conserve precious energy:

- Set thermostat at 68° or lower when you're home. Every degree below 68° saves four percent on your heating bills.
- Wear layered clothing and thick socks to keep warm, and set your thermostat lower.
- At bedtime, lower thermostat even more and add extra blankets.
- Close garage doors; cover foundation vents; close off vents and doors to seldom-used rooms.
- Make sure central heating air filters are clean or replaced regularly.

Stay warm with MLGW's Winter Moratorium

When temperatures drop and gas prices rise, seniors ma experience difficulty paying their utility bill. MLGW does not want to see anyone left in the cold.

MLGW's Winter Moratorium provides elderly (60+) and disabled customers uninterrupted utility service during the coldest months of the year (December 1-March 1). Th program does not relieve customers of their obligation t pay, but it does offer peace of mind with the promise of cut-offs during the winter months.

In order to qualify, residential customers must show proof of age or disability and have a zero balance on their account at the close of business Friday, November 28. Participating customers who have balances on their accounts

MLGW will defer cutoffs for nonpayment for all residential customers between December 15 and January 14 annually. Customers must have an unpaid balance of \$399 or less. This program will allow customers to have extra cash during the holidays while protecting them from getting into serious debt.

 Use a programmable thermostat and/or lower or turn off thermostat when gone for four hours or more.

Keep curtains and



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blinds closed at night and on cloudy days; open curtains on sunny days for warmth.
Place rolled-up towels inside against bottom of exterior.

- Place rolled-up towels inside against bottom of exterior doors and window sills to block wintry drafts.
- Adjust your water heater temperature to 120° or "warm" – it still provides hot water.

Greater energy savings can be realized if you weatherize your home by adding insulation, caulking cracks and gaps, weather stripping, installing storm windows and many other improvements. You can find more weatherization and conservation tips at mlgw.com.
