- •Open interior cabinet doors to expose pipes to warmer air.
- •Let water drip from any faucet served by exposed pipes.
- •Wrap or cover all exposed outside faucets.
- •Lower your thermostat if you're away from your home but avoid turning it off completely so warm air still circulates and keeps your pipes open.

Paving to resume when weather warms

You may notice utility and other excavations around Shelby County that have been repaired and covered with concrete, but not finally paved with asphalt. That is because every year area asphalt production plants close for as long as 90 days during the cold, winter months, so the source of asphalt for repairs is suspended. work is completed will be marked with orange cones and barricades, or metal plates if the work site is in traffic lanes. MLGW will continue to survey these locations until repairs are made and final paving with asphalt resumes in the spring. MLGW Board unanimously rejects 20-year contract with TVA

Memphis Light, Gas and Water's Board of Commissioners rejected a 20-year, rolling contract with the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA). Board Chairman Mitch Graves stated the contract was "too long of an agreement." On September 1, after months



of public and advisory council meetings, work with consultants, and internal debate, MLGW's senior leadership, recommended keeping the TVA as the utility's power



supplier. A public review period began after that. MLGW customers and civic organizations representatives shared concerns through email, social media, and public meetings. MLGW will remain a TVA customer for the foreseeable future.
