New water regulations

For the first time, the federal government is regulating PFAS, or "forever chemicals," in drinking water, to create uniform state regulations in many states, including Tennessee. Per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances, more commonly known as PFAS, are almost impossible to avoid. They are found in our homes, our offices, our supermarkets and in everyday products such as raincoats, nonstick cookware, paints, cleaning products and more. They're called "forever chemicals" because they are nearly indestructible.

To date, no PFAS have been found in our drinking water.

We are working with TDEC and the EPA to perform required testing of our water. (TDEC is sampling untreated water and the EPA is testing treated water.) We are in compliance with both agencies. We are optimistic that our water will pass the testing; however, we are taking the issue very seriously and will perform any remediation that is needed based on test results.
