

Inspectors at Work

You may notice inspectors checking out the wooden utility poles in your neighborhood. They are part of the Osmose Pole Inspection Program.

Programs like the one at Osmose help utility companies like MLGW maintain the strength and integrity



of wooden poles. Inspectors use tools like hammers and bores to check for signs of decay. If inspectors find decay, they dig out the rotten wood and replace it with

Summer Energy Savings

Keeping energy costs low over the summer is not impossible, but you will want to make some adjustments at home. Follow these tips to keep costs in check:



• Set ceiling fans to turn counterclockwise so they push down cool air and create a breeze.

- Grill out instead of using an oven or stove.
- Wash clothes in cold water and lay them out to dry.
- Clean or replace the filter in your air conditioner.
- Seal up cracks or gaps around windows and doors to keep cool air inside your home.
- Turn the AC up or turn it off if you are going to be away from home for more than four hours.

a preservative paste. The paste protects the rest of the wooden pole.

This kind of maintenance is important because instead of replacing an entire pole, which costs an average of \$5,000, MLGW can have the pole repaired instead.
