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MLGW celebrates Tom Lee 100th anniversary

Recently, MLGW proudly celebrated the 100th anniversary of a defining moment in Memphis history—the heroic actions of Tom Lee. MLGW had the honor of hosting members of the Engineers' Club of Memphis (ECM) and descendants of Memphis hero Tom Lee in a ceremony marking the centennial of his life-saving rescue.

On May 8, 1925, the steamboat M.E. Norman, carrying members of the ECM and the American Society of Civil Engineers, tragically capsized and sank in the Mississippi River. Of the passengers and crew, 23 lives were lost. While some managed to swim to safety, Tom Lee, a river worker who could not swim himself, rescued 32 people from the turbulent waters.

Lee made five harrowing trips in his small wooden boat to pull survivors from the river, a feat of extraordinary courage that earned him lasting gratitude from the engineering community. In recognition of his bravery, members of the ECM purchased a home for Lee and sent him a Christmas gift every year until his passing in 1952.

This commemorative event, presented by ECM, served as a powerful reminder of Lee's legacy and the strong bonds that unite Memphis' engineering professionals. Since it was founded in 1914, the ECM has played a vital role in supporting

The Habitat for Humanity team oversaw the day's activities, and the work was carried out by MLGW and TVA volunteers. From measuring and cutting boards to framing exterior windows to carefully installing the windows, our employees brought skills, teamwork, and a spirit of service to every task. Many had never picked up a hammer for a project like this before, but they showed up eager to learn and ready to contribute.

"It was incredible to see coworkers step outside of their day-to-day roles and work together in a completely different setting," said Bonita Anderson, MLGW Corporate Social Responsibility. Tree-trimming goal achieved four months ahead of schedule

Memphis Light, Gas and Water achieved its 2024-2025 treetrimming goal four months ahead of schedule. The goal for the fiscal year, which runs from September 1, 2024, to August 31, 2025, was to trim 1,400 miles of trees and vegetation. MLGW's Electric Construction team met that goal on April 25, with help from contracting companies: Kendall Vegetation Services, Lewis Tree Service, Inc. and ABC Professional Tree Services. "Our customers can all thank this partnership with the tree trimmers and MLGW crews for the significantly

improved reliability we have enjoyed during these severe



spring storms," said utility President and CEO, Doug McGowen.

President McGowen added that tree-trimming crews will continue the aggressive tempo until the entire three-year trim cycle is complete. "Which at this pace, will happen well ahead of schedule."

Memphis Light, Gas and Water significantly ramped up its tree-trimming efforts in 2023 after ending an agreement with a previous vendor and contracting with three different companies for vegetation management. The renewed efforts have had a marked impact on the reliability of MLGW's electric grid.

MLGW customers can call 901-544-6549 to report trees, and other vegetation that is overgrown and

could potentially interfere with electrical equipment.

MLGW participates in the "Safe at Home" program

MLGW is helping to protect victims of sexual assault, human trafficking, domestic abuse and more through participation in the State's Safe at Home address confidentiality program.



Safe at Home, which was launched in 2019, prevents abusers from locating

their victims through public records by providing approved applicants a substitute address that may be used for legal purposes, including utility services.

Safe at Home participants are issued a substitute address they can use anytime they interact with state and local government or anyone – like MLGW – who could potentially make their home address part of the public record. This substitute address can be used by anyone in the household, including children, elderly parents and new spouses. Customer service representatives have been trained so that participants in the program can come into any MLGW Community Office with their cards to be set up in our system. My Account updated

MLGW recently launched an upgraded version of the My Account mobile app. The version offers customers a userfriendly experience. The updated app has an enhanced My Account interface and allows users to access key features with just one click. Customers can now easily see their bills and payment history, apply for the On Track program, check electric outage information, and assign customized nicknames to their accounts for better organization. A new Account Details/Donations button provides access to tools for reporting outages, stopping service, requesting

payment arrangements, enrolling in text alerts and signing up for paperless billing, all from one central hub.

Creating a My Account is simple for new users; all you need to sign up is an email address, MLGW account number, and access code (found on paper bills). Residential customers can call 901-544-6549, and business account holders can contact 901-528-4270 for assistance. No action is required for existing users since the updates were applied automatically. MLGW continues its commitment to improving customer experience by providing convenient, digital access to essential utility services with this upgrade.

Five free things you can do to save energy in the summer

• Adjust your thermostat. In the summer, set your thermostat to 78°F. If the temperature changes are too drastic, raise the

thermostat one or two degrees each week until you are comfortable at 78°F.

- Use ceiling fans or box fans to create a breeze that will make you feel five degrees cooler. For each degree you set the thermostat below 78°F, your monthly cooling costs may increase six percent.
- Block drafts around doors and windows. If you felt cold air seeping under doors and windows during the winter, remember to block those air leaks

during the summer, too. Roll up thick towels and place them inside against the bottom of closed exterior doors and on windowsills to block air leaks. Close your curtains or blinds during the day to block out the sun.

- Keep exterior doors and windows closed. If your house has storm doors or storm windows, make sure they are closed
- Adjust your water heater temperature. A setting of 120°F or "warm" provides hot water and reduces the risk of scalding.
- Cook, wash laundry and do other chores in the morning or late evening. Household chores that produce heat and moisture increase the indoor temperature, making your air conditioner work harder. Do these activities during the cooler hours of the day. Consider drying clothes outdoors instead of using the dryer; it will keep your house cooler and save you money.

Preventing heat-related illnesses this summer

Here are some useful tips to help prevent heat-related illnesses this summer:

- Drink plenty of cool fluids, especially water, and avoid alcohol and caffeine.
- Wear light-weight cotton or natural, loose-fitting fabrics in light colors.
- Limit outdoor activities when temperatures are high.
- Pace yourself. Be sure you don't overdo it in the heat.
- Stay cool indoors using air conditioning or fans.
- Never leave anyone in a car, especially children or seniors.
- Be aware of heat stroke and heat exhaustion symptoms.
- Check on the elderly in times of high heat, as they are more susceptible to high temperatures.
